- Terminal interior fit-out
- First phase of taxi lane KG improvements commenced


New Terminal One Single Track Outage

- AirTrain single track outage needed for New Terminal One's Terminal 1 AirTrain Station pedestrian connector bridge started in early September
- The inner track, which provides the CTA loop, is currently closed
- Closure scheduled to remain in place until on or about 11/22

Terminal 1 Concessions: Construction to start in the next few weeks for duty free spaces






Terminal 5 Updates | Activation of Permanent T5 Egress Roadways

Changes to Occur:

- T5 Egress traffic planned to be shifted onto the permanent route in mid-Novemeber
- T7 access also shifts onto the new roadways
- T7 Departures frontage moves into the Orange Garage with T7 Arrivals
- Existing roadway between the Yellow Garage and T7 AirTrain station closes
- Vehicles on KIAC Rd reduced to Yellow Garage exiting traffic and T7 egress traffic only

Terminal 6 - North Terminal Development





Recently completed:

- Departures roadways steel topping out
- · Terminal substantially enclosed

Ongoing:

- Airside concrete removal, grading, and Econocrete installation
- Airside hydrant fuel system excavation and installation ongoing
- Other Airside utilities such as storm and water installation in progress
- Roadways foundations for R11C and R11C concrete pours ongoing
- Roadways MSE wall construction
- Terminal low voltage, fire protection, fire alarm, and baggage system install and testing
- Vertical transportation install and testing

Concessions:

- Layout and framing for Food & Beverage ongoing
- Layout and framing, MEP, for duty free ongoing

Upcoming:

- Medium-Temperature Hot Water systems and Chilled Water systems commissioning
- Substation 1 and 2 energization

New Terminal 5, 6 & 7 **Flyover Bridge**

- New Terminal 5/6/7 access bridge (J37) scheduled to be activated in this month
- Once activated T5/7 will no longer be accessible from the Van Wyck Expressway
- Major signage changes required both on and off airport to redirect Terminal 5 traffic to the JFK Expressway
- Signage to Terminal 1 Parking to be revised to direct customers to Terminal 8 Parking in lieu of **Terminal 5 Parking**

Installations of high priority sign structures started in September


Installation of 30+ new overhead sign structures throughout the CTA has begun and will continue through Q1 2026



Terminal 4 Outer Arrivals Capture

- Terminal 4 outer arrivals to be closed for a period of 96 consecutive hours
- Allows for installation and tie-in of new Thermal Distribution System lines servicing Terminal 4
- Closure planned to be in place on October 6th through October 9th
- Requires relocation of FHVs and Taxis to remote pick-up Lot 66 during the closure

Institute of Concessions Program





In 2023, the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey announced the launch of a new specialized training program called the Institute of Concessions (IOC), offering extensive training and mentoring intended to increase the number of local and diverse airport concessionaires included in the transformation project of John F. Kennedy International Airport. The IOC is a new, multi-faceted program which provides in-depth knowledge, understanding, and practice of key competencies identified in a study by The Academies of Sciences and Transportation Research Board as necessary to successfully operate a concession in an airport terminal. The education and training are delivered by successful subject-matter experts on topics such as customer experience, financial investment and return, design and construction, operations and management, security requirements and more. Here, businesses learn about scaling their business, the availability of financial resources in the concessions industry, developing bids, and the nuances of operating in the airport among many other topics. The program is




approximately 13-weeks long with training designed to deliver focused business insights that help prepare Food and Beverage and Retail businesses to operate in an airport setting. By completing the IOC, businesses will be equipped with the necessary skills to competitively bid for concession opportunities, win contracts, and effectively operate concessions within the airport. The goal is to create a pipeline of local and diverse businesses that can demonstrate to the Port Authority and its terminal

partners their ability to successfully manage concessions and contribute to the overall success of the airport. The IOC is supported by the Port Authority's private partners in the redevelopment of JFK: The New Terminal One, Delta Air Lines and JFKIAT, JFK Millennium Partners, and American Airlines. The program has been coordinated by Jars of Delight, a local southeast Queensbased minority and women-owned business enterprise (MWBE), and its CEO Dianna Rose, who was selected after a competitive solicitation.

What do you feel is the most important aspect of the IOC program for the business owner?

The most important aspect of the IOC is access — access to knowledge, networks, and opportunities that would otherwise be out of reach for many small and minority-owned businesses. The airport concessions environment is highly complex and competitive, and this program helps level the playing field by breaking down barriers, offering real-world insights, and preparing business owners to compete successfully for contracts.

What has surprised you about leading this program?

What has surprised me most is the sheer depth of talent and creativity among local business owners.

Every cohort reveals entrepreneurs who not only have strong business models but also bring cultural richness and innovation to the table.

I've also been struck by how much interest there is in retail opportunities alongside food and beverage — it's been a pleasant surprise to see the pipeline of specialty retail businesses grow so quickly once we began tailoring outreach to them.

Do you have any notable success stories?

Yes — several. For example, we've seen businesses move from being completely unfamiliar with airport concessions to becoming credible candidates with viable concepts ready for submission to terminal developers.

Alumni have leveraged the program to secure new partnerships, expand into new locations, and strengthen their operations. One standout example is Keishon Warren of BKLYN BLEND - a local QSR that came in with limited exposure and, through the IOC, positioned themselves as a strong partner for both a JV partnership a

licensing deal here at JFK. Those kinds of transformations reinforce the essential value of this work.

What are you looking forward to most in future cohorts?

I think I'm most looking forward to seeing how we can continue to shape the new JFK Airport into a true New York sense of place. As the vision for the airport endeavors to reflect the culture, diversity, and entrepreneurial spirit of the city it serves, this program is an essential aspect in making that vision real. Each group of business owners brings new flavors, products, and stories that make the airport through the various concessions feel authentically connected to New York. I'm also excited to watch how alumni and future cohorts help redefine what passengers expect from an airport experience — turning it into a showcase for the best our local communities have to offer.
